The Gordon Parks Foundation Raised Over \$1.3M at Event Honoring Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Chelsea Clinton, Carol Sutton Lewis and William M. Lewis, Jr., Raf Simons, and Kehinde Wiley

Foundation Commemorated 20th Anniversary of A Great Day in Hip-Hop at Annual Awards Dinner & Auction on June 4

June 5, 2019, New York, NY—Last evening, The Gordon Parks Foundation celebrated Gordon Parks' legacy and honored those who continue his vision for social change through their work in the arts and humanitarianism. The event honored Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Chelsea Clinton, Raf Simons, and Kehinde Wiley, and The Patron of the Arts Award was bestowed to civic leaders and philanthropists Carol Sutton Lewis and William M. Lewis, Jr. Bringing together approximately 600 guests from across the arts, music, fashion, philanthropy, journalism, and business, the event raised over \$1.3M to support the Foundation's year-round grant-making and educational initiatives. Hosted by comedienne and actress Sarah Jones, the evening also featured a performance by The Roots.

Guest presenters for the evening included Harvard University professors **Sarah Lewis** and **Alexander Soros** (who presented to Chelsea Clinton); artist **Anne Collier** (who presented to Raf Simons); hip-hop artist and activist **Kaseem Dean** (who presented to Kehinde Wiley); and real estate developer **Douglas Durst** (who presented to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. In addition, **Questlove** and **Black Thought** gave remarks about the pivotal Parks's photograph, *A Great Day in Hip-Hop* (1998), of which they were a part.

Ahead of a live auction of 10 photographs by Gordon Parks, The Gordon Parks Foundation Executive Director Peter W. Kunhardt, Jr. announced the establishment of The Gordon Parks Arts and Social Justice Fund, dedicated to supporting the Foundation's vital grant-making and educational initiatives that champion artists and current and future generations of creatives. The program also recognized 24 of the Foundation's 2018-2019 recipients of these vital fellowships, scholarships, and prizes. All proceeds from the event and live auction will support these programs through the new Fund.

To close the evening's program, figures from *A Great Day in Hip-Hop* – including **Fab 5 Freddy, Questlove, Slick Rick** and others – came together to take a new photograph in commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the iconic image. The original photo, taken for *XXL* in 1998, was modeled after an Art Kane photograph from 1958 of major jazz musicians of the era. Parks' version came about as a modern reinterpretation of popular music—recontextualizing the genre as more than a rebellious pop culture and inaugurating the subjects as the vanguards of a new type of music. The 2019 version of the photo was taken by 2018 Gordon Parks Foundation Honoree **Jamel Shabazz**.
