

Bard Graduate Center Announces Fall 2019 Public Programs

Diverse programs to feature events on fashion history and scholarship as well as collaborations with the MacArthur Foundation and the Rational Dress Society

New York, NY– August 15, 2019 – Continuing its 25th anniversary celebration of academic excellence and dedication to the study of decorative arts, design history, and material culture, Bard Graduate Center announces its upcoming season of eclectic public programming. Featuring a robust lineup of programs including discussions with MacArthur fellows, seminars on new scholarship in fashion history, maker workshops, and a performative runway show—BGC's fall public programs expand on themes explored in BGC Gallery's forthcoming exhibition *French Fashion, Women, and the First World War* and include other events designed for scholars and curious enthusiasts alike.

French Fashion opens September 5 and is curated by Maude Bass-Krueger and Sophie Kurkdjian, pioneering leaders in the emerging field of fashion history studies. The exhibition's exploration of the dynamic relationship between the War, the fashion industry, and gender roles builds on the institution's commitment to the study and integration of multidisciplinary research, graduate teaching, and public exhibitions.

MacArthur x BGC

Developed in partnership with the MacArthur Foundation to boost community and collaboration among its fellows, BGC will present *MacArthur x BGC*—an unprecedented conversation series that will convene alumni of the MacArthur Fellows Program for three evenings of discussions on the concept and practice of research.

Moderated by BGC Dean and Professor (and MacArthur Fellow) Peter Miller, each session will feature a leading artist, scientist, and humanist who will talk about the role of research in their practice. Acclaimed poet Campbell McGrath will also attend each session, where he will record and interpret each discussion. Tied to BGC's 2019-20 research theme of "Whose Story?", *MacArthur x BGC* will launch a project on research that will culminate in an exhibition at BGC in Fall 2023.

Make-Your-Own JUMPSUIT with the Rational Dress Society

Led by the Rational Dress Society (RDS), BGC artists-in-residence, this workshop will provide an opportunity for participants to construct their own JUMPSUIT, the collective's signature mono-garment intended to replace all clothes in perpetuity. As participants construct their JUMPSUIT, RDS will lead



lectures and discussions, about the origins of modern counter-fashion and the contemporary garment industry. By the end of the workshop, each participant will have learned to read and prepare an industrial pattern and will have begun the process of cutting and sewing their very own JUMPSUIT.

The Rational Dress Society Presents a History of Counter-Fashion Co-Presented by Bard Graduate Center and the Museum of Arts and Design September 28, 2019 General \$10; Students/Seniors/Members \$5

The Rational Dress Society Presents a History of Counter-Fashion is a performative runway show and lecture presentation that chronicles a history of revolutionary and counter-fashion from the late 1700s to present day. Accompanied by an original score composed by Michael Webster, the runway show and lecture will present garments such as the Black Panther Party uniform and monokini, and consider their respective roles in the history of counter-fashion.

Fashion & Justice

Fashion & Justice is a one-day workshop, curated by Kem Jenkins and Jonathan Square, that examines the role of fashion in contending with and challenging inequality through sartorial ingenuity. The workshop will include analysis of artistic work and projects, partial film screenings, reviews of related literature, conversations with guest speakers, and a look at contemporary designers, artists, journalists, curators, photographers, and academics who explore fashion's role with a critical lens.

Courses and Seminars

New Perspectives on French Fashion History

Over the course of five weeks, *New Perspectives on French Fashion History* will highlight new research in French fashion history through sessions taught by emerging thought leaders in the field. Classes will explore the history of fashion display in Parisian department stores and presentations at World's Fairs, the transformative impact the First World War had on the French fashion industry, the cultural shifts brought about by the introduction of ready-made fashion in the 1950s-60s, and more.

Fashion and Material Culture: New Research

Honoring BGC's mission to bridge the divide between texts and objects, *Fashion and Material Culture: New Research* will look at the direction in which the field of fashion studies is advancing today. This symposium will invite scholars who think critically about fashion's materiality to present their latest findings in a symposium on new research in fashion studies.

As part of BGC's signature approach to scholarly and thorough exploration of new ideas, each exhibition at the BGC Gallery is accompanied by a symposium that is free and open to the scholars, industry professionals and the general public.
