Norton Presents American Art Posters from the Leonard A. Lauder Collection at The Metropolitan Museum of Art

WEST PALM BEACH, FL (Feb. 13, 2020) –An exhibition of Art Nouveau posters that contributed to a revolution in graphic design and illustration will open at the Norton Museum of Art on February 21. *American Art Posters from the Leonard A. Lauder Collection* showcases outstanding works of poster art by leading American graphic artists. The majority were commissioned by magazine and books publishers in the late-19th century to celebrate their new publications. Designed to attract new readers and sell books and magazines, these posters were recognized as artworks in their own right, and helped inspire the carefully designed and illustrated book and magazine cover art that remains popular today. Drawn entirely from the Leonard A. Lauder Collection of 1890s American Posters at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the exhibition will remain on view through May 17, 2020.

"American Art Posters presents the highly imaginative, bold, and colorful works by leading American artists that simultaneously fostered new directions in art and design and transformed the book publishing industry," said **Elliot Davis, Director of the Norton Museum of Art**. *"We are thrilled to share with the* public this impressive collection built by Leonard Lauder, a long-time supporter of the Norton. The posters in this exhibition both resonate with and add a new dimension to the Norton's strong holdings of American art, providing context for the important contributions of popular printmaking to the broader evolution of composition and design."

The exhibition features works by leading American illustrators, including William Henry Bradley, Edward Penfield, and Louis John Rhead. They drew inspiration from European Art Nouveau artists, such as Aubrey Beardsley and Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, but created designs that were distinctly their own.

"Works such as those in this exhibition sparked a poster collecting craze in the 1890s—and it's easy to see why," notes **Ellen Roberts, the Norton's Harold and Anne Berkley Smith Curator of American Art**. "These are beautiful and exciting works of art that, to this day, speak to artists, graphic designers, collectors, and the public."

Notable works in the exhibition include:

• William Henry Bradley, *The Chap Book: Thanksgiving Number* (1895) – Bradley is widely recognized as one of the most important figures to introduce

One of a series of posters he designed for the Chicago-based publication, *The Chap Book*, this work's expressive and sinuous designs feature compelling graphics and a flat composition influenced by Japanese wood blocks.

- William Henry Bradley, Victor Bicycles: In Purple and White (1896) Victor Bicycles: In Purple and White uses the cutting-edge Art Nouveau design of period literary posters to promote the new design of the Victor Bicycle.
- Arthur Wesley Dow, *Modern Art* (1895) Dow used one of his preexisting woodcut designs, *Sundown, Ipswich River*, as the centerpiece of this lithograph, and framed it with an abstracted asymmetrical pattern of poppies.
- **Two posters by Louis John Rhead for** *Le Journal de la Beauté* (1896) Commissioned by Parisian publisher *La Plume*, Rhead's posters for *Le Journal de la Beauté* were designed to harmonize with fashionable homes of the period. These designs of swans and peacocks are rendered with abstracted, curving forms in a flattened composition.

This exhibition was organized by the Norton Museum of Art and made possible by the generosity of Robbi and Bruce Toll.

Related programming around the exhibition includes: American Art Posters from the Leonard A. Lauder Collection Friday, March 20 / 7 p.m.

As part of the Norton's weekly Art After Dark program, Emily Braun, Curator of the Leonard A. Lauder Collection and Distinguished Professor, Hunter College and the Graduate Center, City University of New York, will discuss the significance of the posters on view in *American Art Posters from the Leonard A. Lauder Collection* with Norton Director Elliot Bostwick Davis.

About the Norton Museum of Art

The Norton Museum of Art is home to the leading and most far-ranging collection in the region, with distinguished holdings in five areas: American, European, Contemporary, Chinese, and Photography. In 2019, the Norton opened a visionary expansion designed by architecture firm Foster + Partners that included a new 59,000-square-foot Kenneth C. Griffin Building that increased gallery space for the Norton's renowned collection and expanded the Museum's education center.

The transformation of the Museum's 6.3-acre campus created a museum in a garden that also features new, verdant public spaces and a 37,000-square-foot sculpture garden. A group of 1920s-era houses along the south side of the campus were also restored to provide lodging and studios for a new artist-in-residence program.

In 2011, the Norton launched RAW (Recognition of Art by Women), featuring the work of a living female painter or sculptor and funded by the Leonard and Sophie Davis Fund/MLDauray Arts Initiative. In 2012, the Norton established the biennial, international Rudin Prize for Emerging Photographers in partnership with Beth Rudin DeWoody, named in honor of her late father, Lewis Rudin.
